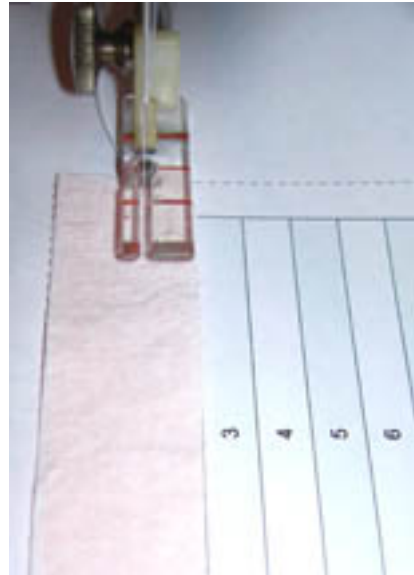
Cut fabric pieces



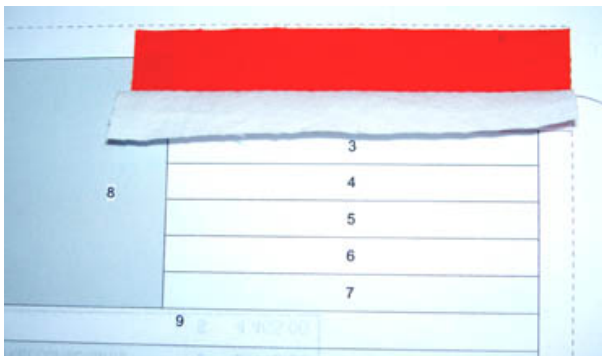
Place 1 red strip & 1 white strip right sides together



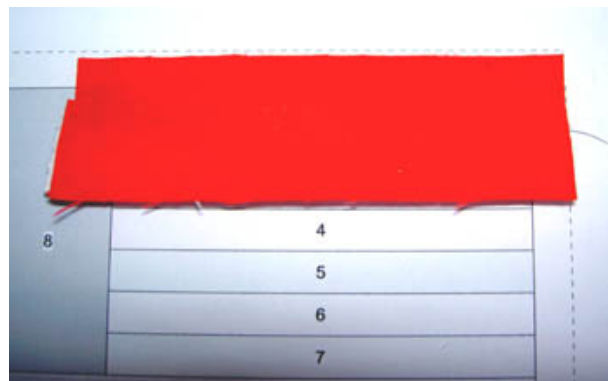
Line up the strips on the sewing line



Sew at the bottom of the first stripe, using a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance



Fold down the second stripe



Place the third stripe on top of the second, right sides together



Sew the third stripe

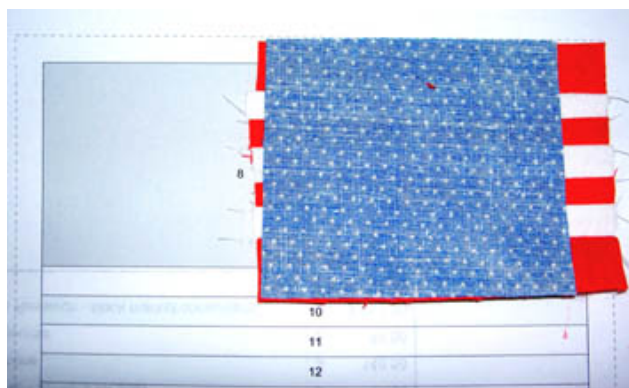


Fold down the third stripe



You could sew the stripes from the back. It's a little difficult to see the lines, but it might be a little easier to sew.

Continue to add stripes until you have all of the short stripes attached



Place the star section on top of the stripes



Sew the star section to the stripes



Fold open the star section



Place the first long stripe, right sides together



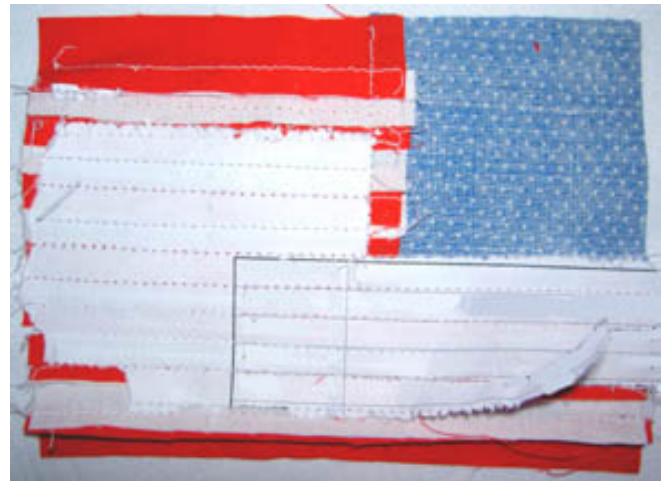
Fold down the first long stripe



Sew the second long stripe and fold down



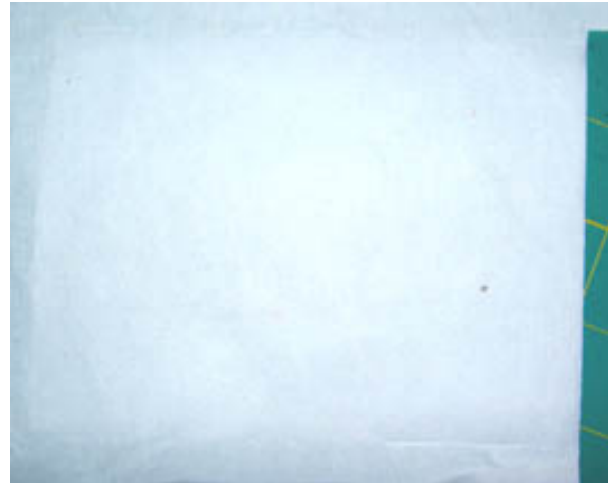
Continue to sew stripes until they are all in place



Tear the paper away from the back



All of the paper is torn off



Measure a piece of lightweight interfacing and the fabric that will be the back of your postcard



Press the interfacing to the backing fabric



Press the top



Measure the back fabric



Trim the edges of the flag top to make them even on all sides



Your flag top and back are all the same size and edges are trimmed



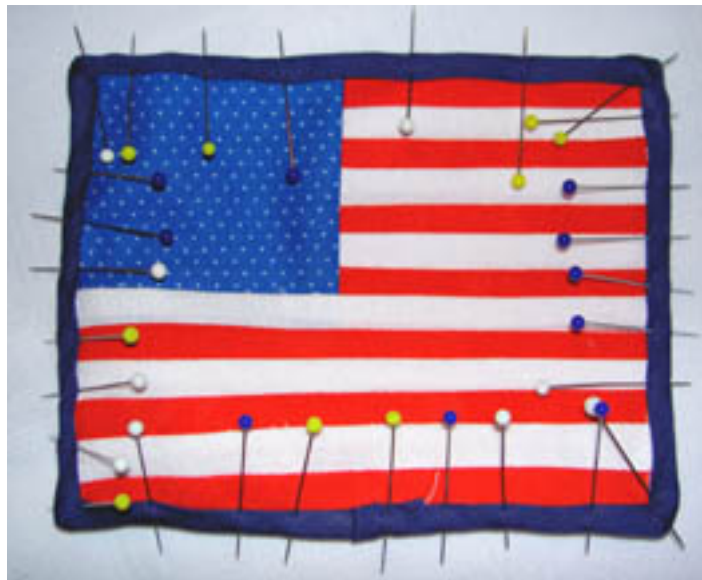
I used double fold bias tape – store bought. Sew the tape until you reach ¼” away from the corner. Remove the quilt top from your machine and fold the bias tape up at a 45° angle as shown above. Note: I began at the center of the bottom of the postcard. And I folded the starting end over by ¼” to make a nice overlap. You will see in the picture below.



Fold down the corner to begin sewing the next side. Continue sewing and turning until all 4 sides are done.



This is the end. Sew new piece on top of the first bias tape you sewed.



Fold the bias tape over to the front of the fabric postcard and pin well. You will be sewing from front to back. I changed the color of my top thread to blue to match the top, and left the bottom thread white, since my back is white.

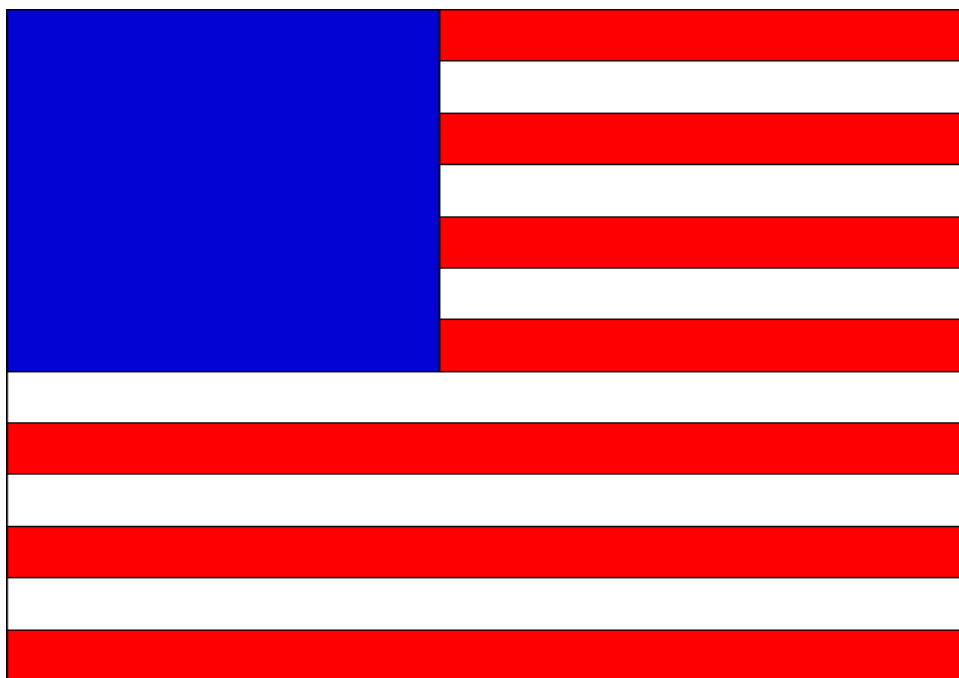
